riage, Alan and Liz are busy with their careers, the activities of their children, Michelle and Paul, and church commitments. They comment that they'd love to be doing more, but there just doesn't seem to be the time left to do more.

Their philosophy of "if everyone does a little bit..." works well with the role Alan and Liz play at First-St. Andrew's. If you are a regular worshipper at the 9:15 service, you've probably noticed that the coffee is always ready – once the Galbraiths have arrived. Liz has also donated tremendous amounts of time to the children's ministry, having helped with *Gone Fishing* and the *Hava Java and Juice* program (which I understand to be just as beneficial to the moms as it is to the kids). The Sunday school will also have a new teacher this fall with Liz stepping in. Liz is enthusiastic about the curriculum since it involves not only the Bible teachings but incorporates music as well. Alan is comfortable having Liz involved in the children's ministry while he gives his time as a member of the Finance committee and yard clean-up crew.



It's understandable why Alan and Liz feel at home at First-St. Andrew's. Alan was baptized in this church after moving to London from Whitby when just a year old, and Liz was hooked after the first service she attended when Tony Gazzard was preaching.

Alan and Liz attended the University of Western Ontario together, and in fact shared a couple of economics classes (Liz stresses that she was glad of the help Alan offered her). Alan carried on to earn a degree in economics and administrative studies, and is currently working in the finance division of GM. Liz currently works for Bell in network planning. She took some years off to raise her children. While she was at home Liz babysat other children and took a systems analyst course offered through Bell in the evenings.

Coming from different religious backgrounds (Liz grew up Catholic in Midland where she played the bells in the bell tower) it was important for them to show their children a strong joint commitment to one church. Together, Alan and Liz have brought their children into FSA, seeing it as a positive role model in a society that is otherwise so "me" focused.

Series: God's Stewards

NANCY MCNEE

London citizens and the members of First-St. Andrew's, in particular, were overjoyed to learn that Nancy McNee has been named a member of the Order of Canada for her commitment over the years to the Arts, education, and community fundraising. She is a remarkable individual.



The FSA connection began in 1949 when she married John McNee in the Mount Brydges United Church, where her father was the minister. John and his family had attended First-St. Andrew's for a number of years. After the young married couple settled in their Dufferin Street apartment, John introduced Nancy to Dr. John Y. MacKinnon, the current minister at the time, regarding membership. Subsequently, she was interviewed by Dr.

G. A. Wheable, Clerk of Session, and a warm welcome was extended by Dr. Bill Johnson.



Nancy recalls the Friday evening Preparatory Service, when membership was confirmed prior to the Sunday morning Communion Service. Shortly thereafter, she was visited by Peg Stevenson and Dorothy Lawrence who outlined various church activities that would provide an opportunity for fellowship and service. Her interest in young people led her to become involved with the Explorer and CGIT groups, as well as teach Sunday

School for a number of years. They joined the Mr. and Mrs. Couples Club, and Nancy joined the Delta-Rho (WMS) that met on Tuesdays.

Over the years, local agencies became aware of her leadership qualities and her enthusiastic team approach. Her early involvement with the Women's Christian Association led to her appointment (1999) as Honourary Chair of Parkwood Hospital Foundation's Initiative to raise \$6.5 million for rehabilitative and geriatric research.

Nancy has been associated with the United Way since 1949 and was elected to the Board in 1989. She assisted with the campaign for several years and is currently serving with the Leadership Giving Committee.

Her interest in the Arts has led her to the Grand Theatre as a member of the Board (1988), and Chair of the Community Relations Committee and the Capital Renewal Appeal (1994). She has participated as a member of the Stratford Summer Music Festival Executive Committee and as an Advisory Board member of the Blyth Festival Theatre. In 1993, she was included in the Mayor's New Year's Honour List for her outstanding contribution to the Arts in London.

Along the way, she has remained loyal to The University of Western Ontario from which she graduated. She has been a board member of the UWO Alumni Association, Chair of the UWO Conference for Women (Choices '98 and Choices '00), and Chair of UWO Selection Committee for Alumni Awards of Merit (1998-2000).

FROM THE PARISH NURSE

Even though I have been working at First-St. Andrew's for three years as the Parish Nurse, there are some members of FSA still asking, "What does the Parish Nurse do?" and "Why does a nurse work in our church?"



If I told you my title was "Minister of Pastoral Care and Visiting" most of you would have an "Aha" moment, but because I am a nurse there is an added dimension to a visit when it is appropriate. There are many times when a friendly visit to a member of the congregation includes some form of nursing advice and/or support. I may be answering questions about alternative living arrangements - a possible move to a Retirement or Nursing Home; supporting a family member dealing with these changes or helping someone to more fully understand a disease process. I also try to promote wellness and independence by pointing out ways people may remain safely in their own home. I deal with all age groups. I am not just here for the "elderly".

My background in Community Nursing and Long Term Care as well as many years of Emergency Nursing have given me a broad range of knowledge for the work I am doing now.

Why am I called a "Parish" nurse when we do not have a Parish? Granger Westberg coined the phrase approximately 25 years ago when he started the modern Parish Nursing Program in Illinois. It is not a new concept but rather goes back to biblical times when healing and wholeness was the body, mind and spirit. I feel that Parish Nursing complements the work being done by the rest of the staff team here at FSA. If you would like to know more - call me or better yet, come and see me.

NEW STRETCHER

We hope there's never a need to use it, but there is now a newer stretcher in the church available for emergency situations. It's located under the coat-rack in the Narthex (where the old stretcher was). The new stretcher has been donated to the church by Ferno Canada.

It is lighter, easier to use, and the wheels work (the old stretcher's wheels were almost locked up). In addition it can be raised for easier transfer or put in a seating position. Narthex coordinators will be instructed on how to operate it.

THE LAUDAMUS BELLS - A HISTORY

The Laudamus Bells (formerly the Ladies' Handbell Choir) have been in existence since 1970. The original three octaves of bells were purchased from Whitechapel Bellfoundry in England through a special gift to the music programme. Barrie Cabena travelled to England when the bells were ready to officially take delivery, and brought them “home” to First-St. Andrew's.

The choir was formed immediately, and directed by Merrie Young. In 1973, Barbara Plante took over as director of the bellchoir, and has continued to this day. We have one original member from 1970, Bev Lindsay, who has been a faithful member through the years, with a couple of years off in the late 1970s.

The purpose of the bell choir is to ring in the services of worship at FSA. However, over the years, they have agreed to many outside performances at other churches, nursing homes, and community groups. The group has also encouraged other bell choirs in the area by organizing and hosting (in our church) the first ever Ontario Handbell Festival and establishing the Ontario Guild of English Handbell Ringers (OGEHR). The first president of that organization was Alan Barthel who was our Director of Music at that time. Since then the group has hosted three more festivals in our church for bellringers in Southwestern Ontario, travelled to two International Festivals, one in Vancouver in 1986 at which time they played at Expo '86, and the second in Birmingham, England in 2000.

Ringling in a handbell choir is a unique way to make and enjoy music. It is unlike any other musical experience, because ringers play selected notes only. There is wonderful teamwork involved, and participants work very closely together. In a handbell choir, ringers have the utmost respect for one another, because each player is of equal importance. The ringers form very close working relationships, and in many cases, very close friendships.

EARTH STEWARDSHIP REPORT

The Earth Stewardship Committee was formed in the early 1990s by the late Spencer Inch. Over the years, the committee has been involved in various educational endeavours, and has co-ordinated the annual Earth Stewardship service.

Committee members initiated a paper recycling program for the church community before the city commenced its program, encouraged the congregation to avoid use of styrofoam cups, and prepared the popular lists of environmental hints that ran for several years in the weekly bulletin. In addition, members of the congregation joined with committee members to study Global Action Plan materials.

Why should the church be interested in environmental issues? One explanation is provided in the following quotation from *Caring for Creation*, a book by David Hallman of the United Church head office:

"God created the earth and loves it. As part of that creation, we have been given some particular responsibilities for it. We are to exercise those responsibilities as obedient stewards. Our role is to care for the earth, recognizing that it belongs not to us but to God."

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

About 175 people joined in a lively discussion of various aspects of FSA at the Congregational meeting Oct 21. The focus of the discussion was a report from the Long Term Financial Committee which was set up by council to respond to the church's financial crunch. Finance Committee figures show a deficit in this year's operating budget.

The committee's proposals were designed to build a strong financial platform on which our new ministerial team can function, including stronger membership, attendance and influence on our member's lives..

There were suggestions on how to make FSA a more welcoming place for the community and a plan for dealing with bequests and trust funds that would allow council flexibility with its operating budget.

Several proposals were singled out for questions and comments, including proposals dealing with music, the rental of church property (and use of wine) and the amount of M&S givings. One suggestion was the placement of questionnaires in pews to solicit the views of members of FSA. Council will deal with all these issues at future meetings.

I am so very pleased to be a member of First-St. Andrew's United Church for many reasons. One important one is the openness and generosity of the members themselves. When it comes to supporting causes and individuals in crisis and need of healing, our membership exemplifies true community. Over the past 15 years, HIV and AIDS have affected FSA's membership, our relatives and friends. We have consistently been caring supporters all of these individuals through

their difficult times.

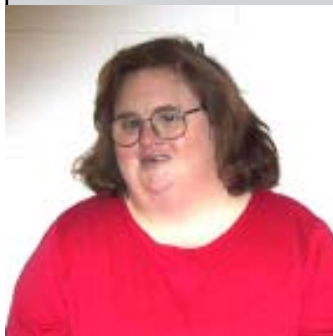
Although in recent times there has been good medical progress in treating and making HIV and AIDS more manageable and therefore less deadly, that hopefulness is limited to those in countries with health programs and benefits that provide access to new medications. Millions of new cases are reported annually and millions continue to die who don't have access to such benefits. HIV does not discriminate - it does not care what race, sex, sexual orientation or social status you are...it can infect and affect anyone. In London, the number of new cases of HIV being reported continues to grow and the populations being affected are broader: in fact approximately forty percent of total cases in southwestern Ontario are female.

The generosity of Londoners is also slowly growing. On September 23rd, the annual London and Canada-wide AIDS Walk was held. Our revenues from that effort have grown to near \$32,000. Thanks to all of you who have supported various walkers in our community.

I volunteer with the John Gordon Home in London. They provide hospice and supportive living services to people challenged with AIDS and HIV. Through the generosity of many friends and members at FSA, I raised approximately \$2,300 in the walk. Thank you for your ongoing interest in and support of this cause.

THE SUSAN WRIGHT BELL AWARD

Anthony Hillman captured our activities on video. An edited version has been placed in the library, and is available to anyone who may be interested in viewing our awesome adventure.

It is my sincere hope that FSA will make VBS an annual tradition. The outreach potential, together with the impact it can and will have on the lives of countless people, regardless of age, is tremendous.

A long line of eager shoppers awaited the 9 a.m. opening of the UCW's fall rummage sale. Nor were they disappointed by the quality clothing, accessories, household effects, books, toys, etc. they found at a reasonable price!

The rummage sale serves a dual purpose. It provides an outlet through which church families can recycle things they no longer need or use, and it gives families with limited budgets the opportunity to shop for good merchandise at bargain prices. There is a social aspect as well. Our customers are greeted with warm smiles and an exchange of pleasant banter with the many men and women who give a Saturday morning to make this sale a success. Thanks to all who helped.

The \$2500 proceeds from the October sale helps the UCW to fund their outreach projects like sponsoring people from the congregation to workshops and seminars, the most recent being a seminar for Caregivers given at Five Oaks; paying the shipping charges on books that a member assembled for use in a church school in Trinidad; and picking up the tab for the dry cleaning bill so that our Senior Choir has fresh gowns.

Each week the flower committee takes responsibility for providing flowers to beautify the chancel for Sunday service. Members often place memorial flowers or an arrangement in honour of a special occasion. These are gratefully received and if you would like to honour the memory of someone or some occasion, there is a flower chart in the atrium on which you can indicate the Sunday of your choice. After the service these arrangements are split into bouquets and taken to church members in hospital, nursing homes, or just confined because of illness.

The UCW is part of a regional body of United Church Women in Middlesex Presbyterial.
